When buying groceries, would you pass over a dented apple or a slightly browned banana?

Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) estimates that each year, approximately one-third of all food produced for human consumption in the world is lost or wasted. This food wastage represents a missed opportunity to improve global food security, mitigate environmental impacts and resources use from food chains.

According to the National Environment Agency (NEA), Singapore generated 791,000 tonnes of food waste in 2016 - equivalent to each person throwing away two bowls of food every day. In a <u>survey</u> involving 1,000 people, household appliance company Electrolux found that 83% of Singaporeans would only buy fruit and vegetables that look fresh and good. It also revealed that a quarter of them will never eat "ugly food" (i.e. fruit and vegetables that had misshapen or bruised).

Food waste is a real and increasing concern and we all have a shared responsibility to start making changes in our homes. Ugly food can taste just as good as perfect-looking food and is as nutritious. Embrace the ugly because #UglyIsTheNewGood.


